

London Derry March 20th. 1847.

Your letter December 25th 1846. we received joyfully.
Twelve months has rolled by from the later end
of February was a year. Robert Wilky came to
thresh our oats I help'd to unload, it fortune
that there was none to help him only myself
he told me to bear up no more than I was able
he was eager to get at the work the next morning
in short I got weakly through March, on April
the 10th which was my 80th Anniversary I went to
Myrina, after that time and throughout the summer
I was afflicted with pains. Your Mother was
labouring ^{under} trouble of the ^{stomach} kind, we used the bark
of the prickly Ash, the root we found to be the most
powerful in healing when accompanied with
the blessing, without which the means doth
prove ineffectual. We are bless'd with a great share
of good health, considering our advanced age.
Arthur leaves nothing undone that he thinks
would make us comfortable. Jane Keel is raising
a numerous family to Arthur. Old Jean Gordon
has been with Arthur. Tara and Gurney's trading
trading by water and by land, from Wheeling
to Orleans, Gurney billeted the wife & bears
with her father John Workman, very like
he could have done without them. they that
trade on the or on the River, have their coffers filled
with gold and silver, very like they'll learn to
live up to it. John and Margaret Walkins how
they have two lads, and two lasses, healthy
and smart, the young one was born 3drd of Jan-
uary. I know what they'll call him, it may be
I got a letter from Adam December 27th 1846
he say he can travel half a mile in a straight
line and not beat the end of it. He says can
eat fruit of his own planting, we have more
bees than ever you seen us having in
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December 22, 1846 a great many of up ~~the~~
the country Irish settles in W. Canada
the arga people that fed on hedges in Ireland
the potatoe rot is grievous to them. its not
good for us to tell

High Henry has sent a letter to John in
Fair-view John and Patrick expects him
in this country very soon, tells he has eat
eat a potatoe since October last. When he
comes the new will be to us like cold wather
to the thirsty soul. I intend communicating to
you very largely what I can get. Due June
recollect the Begg's that came with us un-
till we came near our stopping place, old
Jacks Vancry sister to James and Thomas
and George. The young mans name's
McCauley, O what news he brought across
the Atlantic; he has told and we believe
that James Glasgow has an illegitimate
Heir, by his servant maid Henry Barkly
daughters. We had a wedding on the 30th of this
month, guess who are the parties, John Slope
and the accomplish'd Maria Orr our friend
both members of our congregation. Mr. Derry
The Jews kept their weddings eight day
John Stuart and Jordan Marshall both
are sisters sons of Mrs. Orr's now so call'd
Stuart is ready to attend Divinity. Hall
Marshall's now complect in Latin
and Greek; (said the great John Hutchinson
where theres no absurdity is unpatrio-
nized. The longer we live weel see the more
of the vanity of this world, and of old
age, we should always be in ^{the} habit of proving
our ourselves whether our faith be
such as we will be able to ^{hold} on Christ
Jesus for righteousness and life.
